VE3TWO Repeater To Be Upgraded

In a move to correct technical problems with the Club's repeater, VE3TWO, which have developed over the past several months, the Executive has voted to replace the repeaters 20 year old receiver with a new SCR200A Hi Performance Receiver. In addition, it was decided to replace the aging coax cable from the repeater to the antenna. Funding for the upgrade will be covered from current budget allocations.

It is expected that the upgrading work will be completed in six to eight weeks.

Ramblings

*Our President, Ernie Jury, VE3EJJ,
would like you to know...*



In reviewing the happenings during the past two years, I am most impressed with the range of activities and changes that have occurred in the club.

There was the comprehensive questionnaire 2 years ago that guided the executive in setting the direction of club activities. The bylaws were reviewed and minor changes made to permit the section chairpersons to hold office for more than two successive years. We have since looked at the bylaws in greater depth and concluded that further changes are not needed. The letterhead logo was adopted as the official club logo, and the terms for its use on items for sale to club members were formulated. Provision was made for the easy formation of special interest groups within the club. A financial short fall last year forced us to sell surplus club equipment and to raise the membership fees for the first time in several years. These actions have reversed the financial picture so that we are expecting a small surplus this year, and are forecasting the same situation for next year. In response to our auditor's recommendation we have produced an up-to-date inventory of club owned equipment. Revenue raising projects by individuals for the benefit of the club were encouraged with a good degree of success. In addition, it was decided to charge a \$2 entry fee at our flea market, and a 50/50 draw was implemented at regular meetings.

Activities and operations within the club have similarly grown. The 70 cm repeater was commissioned and its transmitter replaced and the 2 m repeater receiver is in the process of being replaced as its performance is deteriorating. Tail gate swap meets were successfully inaugurated, and will, I hope, continue. The format of the monthly meetings has broadened with the introduction of a variety night to include

non-amateurs in our activities. The recent experimental variety night was judged to be successful and we are recommending that the next executive consider it as an annual event.

Other in-house club projects include: the assembly and placement of the VE3JW beam antenna; the relocating and upgrading of the VE3JW antennae; the first anniversary celebration of the refurbished station operation which was advertised internationally in 73, QST, and TCA; the building of thirty 40 m receivers for the radio course students; and the collecting and archiving of the club's history. On the philanthropic side the club has purchased 4 VHF SWR indicator kits with audio output, for presentation to the CNIB amateur radio project.

The club has been active in the sphere of public service, having put on a "Talk to Santa" each year at the Museum; participating in "Girl Guides on the Air" weekend for the past 2 years; providing demonstration stations at the 50th anniversary VE Day celebrations, the Central Canada Exhibition, and the boat show at Dow's Lake. Club members participated as communicators at Ski Marathons, National Capital Air shows, and at the Guinness book of records 50 horse hitch at Navan. Undoubtedly there are other instances of public service on the part of club members of which I am not aware.

Other forms of club publicity undertaken have been the purchase of the club banner that you see at every meeting, and an OVMRC home page on the internet which is still being crafted.

In addition to the exchange of newsletters with other clubs there has been contact on specific projects. We contacted the Calgary

OVMRC Regular Meeting, May 9, 1996.

The meeting was called to order at 19:40 by President Ernie. The membership welcomed guests Rod, W9BRD, from Chicago, Jim, VE3IQ and Mike, VE3BUP.

Field Day Mystique

What is it about that weekend in June that drives sane people to join other amateurs in a lemming-like migration to one of the local Field Day sites? Some instinctive drive makes them perform feats of strength and daring, erecting outlandish antennas and attaching them to every tree or other structure in sight.

Attired in headgear emblazoned with call signs, these otherwise staid pillars of the community swarm up shaky towers and undersized trees trailing masses of wire and coax, while chanting, "Only forty-five minutes left" and "Did anyone check the generator?" Or they implore each other to find "just one more barrel connector."

At ground level an equally fanatic group searches for the missing mike being carried around by another group looking for "the rig." But "the rig" is still in the trunk of a car now hurrying off site to pick up the extension cord promised by the guy who just called on the repeater to say, "Sorry, but I can't make it before about four o'clock."

At this time the need for the coffee maker becomes critical. The instructions to the appointed person: "Try to make the coffee better than last year's mud." Soon after he carefully measures out the coffee, he screams, "Nobody thought to fill the water bottles!" He disappears racing over to the museum hoping to find a facet high enough to put the water bottle under it.

As two o'clock nears, it becomes clear that all is lost. The classic goes up, "Let's get one dipole up, so we can start with at least one station on the air." Someone attaches coax to two pieces of wire that might be an antenna. Someone else fires up the generator, and runs an extension cord to a rig in one of the tents where a forlorn group huddles over a mike and a CW key in abject sorrow.

Then there's a cry from the trees, "The antennas are up." Log sheets appear next to the now operating rigs, cups of thick black coffee appear from nowhere, and the bands erupt with, "CQ, CQ, CQ, CQ Field Day!" Soon the annual madness peaks; longtime friends stop screaming at one another and

settle down to logging QSOs, as they have for many years. The ritual again enacted, the gods of radio are appeased.

And soon someone sows the seeds of future madness with a simple remark like, "You know, next year we should get our beam on a higher tower to get better coverage."

The cycle, begun anew, will culminate a year hence in another irresistible urge to migrate to "the site."

Hear That Remote?
