OVMRC Meeting Minutes

OVMRC GENERAL MEETING MINUTES FEBRUARY 17, 2000

President Susan opened the proceedings at 1935 hours by welcoming everyone, members and guests, to the meeting. Susan called upon Rob Ludlow to introduce our guest speaker for the evening.

Rob, in introducing Brian Biggings VE3XA/VE3BIE, pointed out that Brian was a member, the only Canadian, of the famous ZL9CI DXpedition in January, 1999. A distinguished and experienced international team journeyed to Campbell Island in the sub-Antarctic, between New Zealand and the South Pole. The DXpedition set many new records, 96,000 QSOs during the 26 days of the event, and set a new standard of excellence and performance for Amateur Radio DXpeditions.

In introducing his presentation Brian pointed out the DXpedition was in the planning stage for three years. He also stated that to be invited to participate in a world class DXpedition you must be the organizer, know an influential person or be world known as a leading Amateur. He said the group amassed and took with them to Campbell Island five and one half tons of radio equipment The Island is strictly controlled conservation area by the government of New Zealand which was reluctant to give the group a permit to use the Island as it's base.

The government insisted that the group not stay on the island overnight, which meant they had to return to their anchored ship in the bay and they had to leave the island in the same condition as they found it upon first landing. Brian said the group had set out to be one of the best DXpedition which it was by being recognized, some weeks following their return to their respective homes, as the best DXpedition of the Year Brian showed the Club an excellent video of the DXpedition which included gathering their equipment, loading it on their chartered ship at New Zealand, their set-up and operations at Campbell Island and finally their take-down and departure from the Island.

An interesting questions and answers session followed the video presentation. Susan thanked Brian for coming to Ottawa to make his presentation. She presented him with a Certificate of Appreciation on behalf of the Club. John Barnhardt reminded that the OVMRC Flea Market will be held at the Stittsville Arena on Saturday, May 6th. Tables are available at \$10 each. Volunteers are needed to help in setting up tables the day prior to the Flea Market. Door prizes were won by Rob Ludlow, Ken Barry and Andre Pilon. The 50/50 draw was won by Bill Hall (\$51.) The meeting was adjourned at 2115 hours for coffee, cookies and ragchew.

set up in the National Museum of Science and Technology and I thought members would like to be informed of them.

We had to take a look at our Volunteer's list and bring it up to par with the Museum's policy line. Some of the volunteers who had signed up some time ago did not have their volunteer card renewed by the Museum, as they did not have any entries in the volunteer's book for a period of twelve months. However, they were still on the remote area of the Museum, providing public interaction. volunteer's list at the Security Office.

When we wanted to investigate some minor security breaches such as back door left opened, switches left on, lost key, etc., we found that some of the volunteers on the list did not have a valid volunteer's card and therefore they were not covered by the Museum's insurance.

In order to ease the Security Office's task of verifying the list, we had to review the list and leave on it only those that are entitled to sign for the key to the Radio Room. The previous list had 48 names on it.

A new list was produced that contained three levels for our volunteers: the regulars, the occasionals, and the standbys. The regulars are those that come in to work the VE3JW station once a week. The occasionals are those that come in once a month. The standbys are those who prefer to come when needed and called upon for special events, for technical repairs or renovations, as climbers to the roof and tower, or to work on RFI/EMI problems. The standbys have no pass because they may not be called upon for any twelve-month period, and then, they are only called once in a Maurice-André Vigneault while.

So, if you're one of the volunteers, it would be advisable to check with the Museum, or with me (ve3vig), before you go in. Your name may no longer be on the list at Security if you have not been around for the last twelve months.

In another light, we are forever looking to improve the Amateur Radio Exhibit. Installation of digital modes on HF now permits HF Packet, RTTY/AMTOR and soon PSK31. While still using a single TNC, the MFJ-1278, we have installed a Pentium computer and a switch box allowing selection of either computer. The 486 computer is used for VHF Packet and APRS, and the Pentium for the TS-850 logging program and HF digital modes.

We are looking into the installation of a second TNC (DXP38) to facilitate simultaneous demonstration and ease the difficulty in tuning the HF rig and the TNC located too far apart.

The Satellite Communications Demonstration Station is advancing in the Museum's Administration program. As the Museum is searching for new and up-to-date ways of interesting the visitors, we have submitted our proposal and it has been accepted as a feasible project. We hear that it has been selected for budgeting for the new fiscal year. If accepted for budget we will have to wait for the proper time frame to obtain funds.

In a previous Rambler we informed you of the Rotor repairs. We also have repaired the Yaesu FT-230R VHF Radio that had a squelch and audio amplifier problem. The Yaesu FT-757GX was sent to the Museum's shop for repairs. The power supply was repaired and is functioning quite well and the radio was tested on several bands and operating satisfactorily on the receive side but Rambler, April 2000

 \mathbf{T} e've had a few changes at the VE3JW demonstration station only putting out 40 watts on the transmit side. It is now back to the shop for further attention. Nevertheless, good world-wide contacts were made with propagation helping immensely.

> We will then work on the TEN-TEC OMNI to bring it up into operation and hope to have it ready for Field Day 2000. We will also try to install the ATV as a permanent demo and ask the Museum if they are interested in purchasing a hand-held ATV unit for use in a

> We will also attempt to have an APRS demo with visitor's access. It would consist of a monitor in a plastic cage with extended control buttons on the front, only the few necessary to navigate, or a mouse control for the APRS Internet connection.

> Another future project for the VE3JW station is to run videos for information and demonstration purposes such as the ZL9CI DXpedition, the Club's Field Day videos and other activities.

> Through this renewed planification, the support of the Museum, and with the help of the Amateur community, we hope to make of VE3JW a world class radio station.



Industry Canada issues new Amateur Radio Information Circulars

Industry Canada has recently posted one new, and three revised Information circulars on their Strategis web site.

RIC 3 updates Operating Information to reflect the changes to be introduced with the new authorization process on April 1

RIC-9 spells out in detail the policies governing amateur radio call signs and special callsigns and prefixes.

and RIC-7 and RIC-8 are updated versions of the new examination question banks.

Subject: Industry Canada seeks comments on 2285-2483.5 Mhz

Industry Canada seeks comments on policies for the band 2285-2483.5 MHz

Industry Canada has recently released a proposed policy governing spectrum utilization in a band which overlaps the amateur 2300-2450 MHz band If approved, the policy will make provision for ore users of this part of the spectrum. At the present time, Canadian amateurs have only a secondary allocation between 2300 and 2450 MHz, and may not cause interference to primary users.

The proposed policy does not mention our current request for a primary allocation around 2400 MHz, nor does it propose any changes which would take into account our concerns.

Merge the Ottawa Amateur Radio Club (OARC) and the Ottawa Valley Mobile Radio Club (OVMRC)? What a question! As promised in a previous column, here is the "Editor's View," Charles King VE3PDK, from the December 1989 RAMBLER. Charles noted that goodwill would prevail and the men involved in the merger discussions would put aside their differences for the greater good of Canadian amateurs. Charles expected we would be able to give our full support to one organization, rather than grumbling about paying two membership fees and not knowing which deserved our loyalty.

It is a pity to note today, in spite of the successful creation of Radio Amateurs of Canada (RAC), the majority of Amateurs still do not financially support RAC through membership. Maybe we will have more Amateurs join RAC now that licence fees are going the way of the Dodo bird! There should be no excuses by any Canadian Amateurs not to invest in RAC now! We can now all send our licence fees, along with a few more dollars to join and support our national organization, the Radio Amateurs of Canada!

Charles criticized the national organizations for prolonging disunity when the lack of unity in the Amateur radio clubs in Ottawa was creating the same sorts of problems. He asked the question "Why are there so many Clubs in Ottawa, some struggling to maintain membership and programs?" He acknowledged the fact that some Clubs meet the special interests of its members, such as the Telephone Pioneers (PARC) and the Royal Canadian Military Police Club. However, he wrote the OVMRC became a Club in the days when mobile radio was the exception. "Mobiling", with its own unique problems and equipment, brought amateurs together to share information and experiences. The OARC has always been a general interest Club and developed special interest groups such as the Packet Radio Group. Charles noted the OVMRC was conducting one of the best Amateur radio courses in Ottawa, while the OARC conducted an Advanced Amateur Radio Course from time to time. Charles pointed out the OARC and the OVMRC had conducted separate Field Days up until June 1989 when they held a very successful joint Field Day.

Guess what is happening this year? Have you heard that Field Day 2000 (FD2000) includes the OARC and eight other local Amateur Radio Clubs? FD2000 should not only be a very memorable event but hopefully, it will have many more stations on the air with all the combined participation by so many clubs. I see history in the making! FD2000 is going to be much greater than the sum of its parts. Will you be part of this special FD2000 and help make history? If you want to participate or learn more, you can attend the meetings being held at every second Wednesday at 7.30pm. Find out where the next meeting is going to be held, check the FD2000 Web page at: http://hamradio.unplug.org

Charles King VE3PDK also noted that both Clubs gave their support to VE3JW, the Emergency Measure Radio Group, the Christmas Santa Claus event for the Sick Childrens' Hospital and many other public events. With regard to a possible merger of the OARC and the OVMRC, he rationalized over the duplication of effort in newsletters, meetings, accommodation, range of services to members, and the split loyalties of many of the members of both clubs. He cited his own case as an example. He was licenced through the OVMRC Radio Course and logically gave the OVMRC his loyalty first by becoming a member but he was also a member of the OARC. Charles was invited to serve on the OARC Executive but *Rambler*, April 2000

declined because of his prior commitments to the OVMRC. He continued to attend meetings of both clubs and noted both were having membership renewal problems in 1989. Charles pondered the possibility of having to decide which club to drop if he could not rationalize continuing his membership in both clubs. He asked the questions, "What might be accomplished if the expertise of both Clubs were pooled? What should we do about this deteriorating situation? What do you men and women of goodwill think we should do about it?"

Today, we should ask the following questions. Has anything changed over the past 10 years to prevent merging the two clubs? Is there any interest to merge the clubs? Are we still duplicating our efforts? Are we still as loyal as we used to be? Could we merge our two clubs into one and improve ourselves as well as continue to satisfy our members' interests? Perhaps it is time to reconsider these questions. Perhaps this year's cooperative and successful FD2000 will be the showcase to demonstrate exactly how much Amateurs can accomplish and how much goodwill there really is amongst local Amateur radio clubs. If we have the desire and goodwill to do it, anything is possible. And if you don't think it can work then have a look at the Calgary Amateur Radio Association (CARA) at: http://www.cara.ampr.org They have a huge organization with more than 300 members and are meeting the particular interests of their members through special interest "Sections" which are meeting the specific needs of members quite well. Perhaps this is another worthy project for Glen VE3GLN to consider? He is the spark plug behind this year's FD2000 and is the Field Day Coordinator. Maybe the OARC and the OVMRC should seriously consider a merger into one new club for Ottawa? What a club that would be!

The December 1989 issue of the RAMBLER also covered some interesting news about CARA. Pat Brewer VE3KJQ, wrote in his column "News and Views From Here and There" that CARA had managed to provide communications from all one hundred and ninety one polling stations during the recent civic Elections and have been doing so since 1966! The London LARC Bulletin reported the Presidents of seven local amateur radio groups met to organize their involvement in CANWARN a severe weather watch system using amateur radio.

Pat reported that both the London and Scarborough news bulletins had covered Reginald Aubrey Fessenden, who was born in Canada and was the first person to transmit the human voice on December 23, 1900. Reginald apparently died in 1932 and was buried in St. Mark's Church cemetery in Bermuda. His epitaph was either, "His mind illuminated the past and the future and wrought greatly for the present." or "By his genius, distant lands converse and men sail unafraid upon the deep." Pat's biography of Fessenden favours the former as the true epitaph. It goes on to note that a line under the epitaph of the memorial stone is written in ancient Egyptian picture writing. It was interpreted as "I am yesterday and I know tomorrow." His genius has led us to a plethora of prolific radio transmissions, not only Amateur radio, but cordless phones, satellites, cell phones and the Internet. Someone credited Fessenden as the greatest Canadian-born scientist, inventor and engineer. We should pay tribute to him more often as does Amateur Jack Belrose who recorded a re-enactment of that first broadcast using a recreation of Fessenden's radio transmitter. APRIL 29-30, 2000 18:00 UTC TO 18:00 UTC

FREQUENCIES: (Phone/CW) All HF bands 160-10 meters with the exception of the WARC bands (12, 17 and 30 meters). All VHF/UHF bands.

SUGGESTED FREQUENCIES FOR MOBILES/QRP: 1.870, 3.735, 3.860, 7.070, 7.260,14.130, 14.265, 21.260, 28.360 on SSB, 1.830, 3.530, 3.720, 7.030, 7.120, 14.030, 21.030, 21.120, 28.030 on CW, 52.540, 146.550, 446.100 on FM

SUGGESTED MANNER OF OPERATION: Work HF SSB on the hour, work HF CW on the half hour, work VHF/UHF (either FM simplex, SSB or CW) at 15 minutes past thehour.

USE OF FM: Operators may not use repeaters for either contest contacts or for soliciting contacts. Please keep the FM simplex calling frequency of 146.520 MHz clear.

CATEGORIES: Multi-Operator, Single Operator Low Power (up to 150 watts on HF, up to 50 watts on VHF/UHF), Single Operator High Power (over 150 watts on HF, and over 50 watts on VHF/UHF), Single Operator Single Band, Mobile, HF QRP (5 watts and under), VHF/UHF FM QRP, CW, SSB or mixed mode, mobile/rover, SWL.

EXCHANGE: Ontario stations send signal report and Ontario county, district, regional municipality, (or city in the case of the amalgamated City of Toronto).

Other stations send signal report and Canadian province/territory, U.S. state or DXCC country.

SCORING: Ontario stations work everyone. Non-Ontario work only Ontario stations. Mobile/rover stations may be worked again as they change multiplier areas. Shortwave listeners log only Ontario stations.

Score 1 QSO point for every station worked on SSB per HF band. Score 2 QSO points for every station worked on CW per HF band. (You may work each station TWICE per HF band, once on phone and once on CW.

On the VHF/UHF bands you may only work a station ONCE per band. Score 5 QSO points for each contact per band.

Score 10 QSO points for working ODXA club station VE3ODX and RAC club station VA3RAC per band. (You may work VE3ODX & VA3RAC twice per HF band (i.e. once on phone and once on CW) and once on each of the VHF/UHF bands.

MULTIPLIER POINTS: Ontario stations earn 1 multiplier point for each Ontario county, district, regional municipality and the amalgamated City of Toronto worked on each band (see multiplier list), each Canadian province/territory (excluding Ontario), each U.S. state and DXCC country worked on each band.

Non-Ontario stations and SWL's claim Ontario multipliers only.

TOTAL SCORE: Total QSO points x Total multiplier points = Your score.

MOBILE/ROVER BONUS: Mobile/Rover stations add 300 points for each Ontario multiplier activated. To earn the mobile/rover bonus a mobile/rover station must make at least three contacts with three different stations from the multiplier.

AWARDS:

CERTIFICATES: to the top scorers in each category and to top scorers in each Ontario county, district, regional municipality, amalgamated City of Toronto. Regional certificates will be awarded to the top scoring stations in each region of Ontario i.e. Northern Ontario (postal code area "P"), Southwestern Ontario (postal code area "N"), Central Ontario (postal code area "L") and Eastern Ontario (postal code area "K").

Certificates may also be awarded in other categories based on the level of activity.

BUTTONS: Each station making over 50 QSO's will qualify for an "Ontario QSO Party" callsign button. Operators at multi-operator stations making over 50 QSO's will also qualify. Please submit \$2.00 per button with your log to help defray costs.

T-SHIRTS: Each station making over 100 QSO's will qualify for an "Ontario QSO Party" callsign t-shirt. Operators at multioperator stations making over 100 QSO's will also qualify. Please submit \$15.00 per t-shirt with your log entry to help defray costs. Also please specify t-shirt size (S, M, L, XL,XXL).
