RADIO AMATEURS OF CANADA (RAC) AMATEUR OF THE YEAR AWARD

- GLENN MCLEOD VE3GLN

During the Ottawa Valley Mobile Radio Club's, September 20, 2001 General Meeting, Doug Leach VE3XK, RAC Ontario North Director, presented the "Radio Amateurs of Canada Amateur of the Year Award" to Glenn McLeod VE3GLN. Doug said this award represented Amateur Radio at the National level. In order to provide some background information about Glenn, Doug read aloud the two page nomination letter which was signed and submitted by Ralph Cameron VE3BBM, George Roach VE3BNO, Ernie Jury VE3EJJ, Rick Ferch VE3IAY, Rick Furniss VE3IHI, Jim Dean VE3IQ, Susan Mogensen VE3MOG, Clare Fowler VE3NPC, and Tom St Julien VA3OFD. Glenn was recognized for his outstanding work over many years in the Amateur Community and particularly for his outstanding leadership in bringing together seven local Amateur Radio Clubs to break the Amateur Radio Field Day World Record for most number of stations on the air. With assistance from about 151 Amateurs from Ontario and Quebec, the record was broken when the words "We are 35 Alpha Ontario" first went out over the air waves at 2pm on Saturday, June 24, 2000. FD2000 was a reality.

By the time you read this you will have enjoyed Thanksgiving Day and many more of those long hot days of summer which are fast declining, the trees are changing colour and leaves are falling. The time has arrived to slow down from our busy summer activities and to reflect on life and Amateur Radio.

OCTOBER 1991 RAMBLER

Neil Herber VE3PUE, Acting Membership Chair, reported as of October 4, 1991, the club had 183 Regular members, 74 Associate members, six Life Members, adding up to a total of 263 members! Forty six-new members had joined the club since the summer and thirty-three of them were students from the Amateur radio course. In addition, Neil reported that 80 members had not renewed.

However, President Jeff Wilson VE3RCI, wrote in his RAMBLINGS column that well more than 80 members attended the September meeting held at the Multi-Service Centre, Heron Road. They had to keep sending for more chairs! Jeff noted the meeting in October would once again be held at the National Museum of Science and Technology.

Ted Paull, VE3KEH, Secretary, noted in the Minutes of the Sept 19, 1991 General Meeting, Dan VE3EBI made a few announcements from the CARF Bulletin including the Boy Scouts Jamboree-on-the-Air (JOTA) and encouraged Members to invite scout troops to the shack. The OARC Flea Market was to be held On Sunday, October 6 in the RA Centre, \$2.00 general admission, \$5.00 for a table, \$20 for commercial vendors. Peter Jago VE3PWJ was the contact. The winner of the Joe Norton Award was Roxanne Delmage VE3VON, a new amateur who had made an outstanding contribution to Amateur radio. The minutes also noted that Cy Webster VE3SIY, announced the Museum Exhibit Committee had one meeting and was gathering pertinent materials for VE3JW. He mentioned the museum was planning to select a design company to create the exhibit which will contain the club station VE3JW.

Keith Beardsley VE3SVQ, wrote the "DX de YOU" and welcomed the new students. He mentioned he was using an old HW 101, 100 watts power, and a wire antenna that cost him \$8 to build. Keith managed to work 48 different countries even though conditions were not very good!

The October Rambler contained only six pages, so we will continue with the next issue.

NOVEMBER 1991 RAMBLER

Half of the front page of the RAMBLER was written by Editor Chuck King VE3PDK. He gave a nostalgic Farewell to President, Jeff Wilson VE3RCI, was moving to bigger and better things with a new appointment in Calgary after only two months into his term as President. Jeff left an impressive record of accomplishments during his three years with the club. He joined as a student in 1988, licenced in 1989, organized a very successful Field Day, was elected Vice-President and volunteered to write the "DX de You" column for the Rambler. Chuck notes that Jeff also took on the job of organizing our annual Flea Market and set a standard that has put subsequent committees to the test. He also organized our meeting programs and much of the growth in the last few years of the Club

were directly due to his informative and entertaining monthly programs. Chuck paid tribute to Jeff's contributions to the growth and the success of the club over his short span of three years as a member and noted Jeff's effort was much more than what most Amateurs contribute during their lifetime. It set an example that is well worth emulating and one which will not be soon forgotten. Jeff had even prepaid his membership for another three years!

President Jeff's RAMBLINGS mentioned how pleased he was to be back in the auditorium of the National Museum with more than 90 members and a few guests that turned out to see a video of the OVMRC/OARC Joint Field Day and the 1990 Field Day of the Blue Mountain Repeater Society in Collingwood. Ken Ascus VE3MVV. A visitor from Barrie was quite surprised to see this video.

Jeff reminisced about his short time with the Club and encouraged members to get involved. He noted the new Executive structure put in place following our 1991 revision of the OVMRC Bylaws, was working well and the volunteer committees now allow more members to be active in directing Club activities. He called upon all experienced OVMRC members, with or without previous OVMRC Executive experience, to consider taking on the position of President for the remainder of the year. He wrote that being President is fun and you get to wax eloquent, pontificates, or just ramble on in the RAMBLINGS column each month about what's happening the Amateur radio and the Club. Jeff enjoyed himself and made many friends through the Club. Jeff planned to keep in touch via the Ottawa-Calgary packet satellite link and expected to write some Western news items in future issues of the RAMBLER. He wrote he would get a tower up for HF eventually and was hopeful of making a sked with the new VE3JW in the Museum in 1993.

Jeff Wilson's words were written more than 10 years ago and are still relevant today, especially since we are currently looking for a new President to lead us through the rest of this year. Susan Mogensen VE3MOG, our Past President is very concerned about our club. She served two years as our President and brought a lot of new interesting programs to our monthly meetings. Our Bylaws only allow a person to serve as President for two consecutive years. So, she volunteered to take on the position of Vice-President and is currently holding this club together. However, she can only devote a limited amount of her time to the task. We still need someone to volunteer as President, someone who has good leadership abilities, lots of common sense, and the ability to motivate people in order to lead the OVMRC over the rest of this 2001-2002 term. The job is not done alone or in isolation by the Directors of the Club. You have a very good Executive Committee which assists with the decision making process and any tasks that may arise. If you want to reap the rewards and personal satisfaction of contributing to the Amateur radio community, step forward and volunteer to serve in some capacity with the Executive. We need your help and you will enjoy yourself.

Bill Balke VE3NPG, wrote a short article in the November 1991 RAMBLER about the 2metre link system which is available through repeater VE3MPC. He covered the proper method of accessing the link and then leaving the link and stressed common sense and the use of courtesy are the most important rules.

Neil Herber VE3PUE, Membership Chair, listed eighteen new members by name and Callsign and also the names of the thirty-two students who were taking the Amateur Radio Course.

In closing out the November 1991 Issue, Ed Sieb VE3RDZ, had a column "FROM THE JUNK-BOX" which featured "A Simple Mic Preamp-interface Circuit for Surplus Commercial FM Radios." He provided the circuit diagram and description to allow you to use a 500 Ohm dynamic mic with Surplus Commercial FM Radios which had no microphone. Ed also gave us instructions and diagram of an easy to make antenna for 6 metres which is built from Radio Shack's "All-Band Base Antenna" for scanners.

With the end of daylight-saving time on October 28, 2001, we will be driving home from work in the dark by 5pm. So please take care, drive defensively and be careful of children crossing streets at unexpected places. Don't forget to slow down and to adjust your driving speed to conditions this Fall (slippery wet leaves on streets) and this Winter (impending snow). Amateur Radio Call Sign Data Base

Date: October 5, 2001

Industry Canada has informed RAC that they have amended the Morse Qualification listings in their Canadian Amateur Radio Call Sign Database now that the Morse requirement for access to all amateur bands is 5 WPM. Because the sole requirement now is 5 WPM, they no longer show the 12 WPM qualification. Industry Canada advises that the modifications to their Canadian Amateur Radio Call Sign Database were completed sooner than expected and that they (IC) were unable to give RAC sufficient warning to allow timely modification to the RAC Canadian Amateur Radio Call Sign Database Web page. Industry Canada have told RAC that they realize the significance to amateurs of showing only the lower code speed and regret any inconvenience this may have caused to the amateur fraternity.

RAC is working to have the offending references removed from the published version of the database as soon as possible.
