Judges declared Jake the winner.





#### **RAMBLER JUNE 1992**

The front page article written by John Moffat VE3NJ, "Hammond Amateur Radio Museum Revisited," was a walk back to the nostalgic days of Amateur radio. John covered the May General Meeting presentation made by our Life Member, Gerry King VE3GK. Gerry used his fine selection of slides to bring the Hammond Museum to life for those attending. Gerry's first slide featured the Collins KW-1 from the early fifties, which, in 1953, was priced at US \$3850. Gerry presented slides showing row upon row of receivers, transmitters and accessories and all sorts of equipment including Collins, National, Hammarlund, E.F. Johnson, RCA and many others. A very interesting presentation

John noted his first really good receiver was a Drake 2B, with a crystal-controlled oscillator with variable selectivity and passband tuning, a modern feature for its day, 12 tubes, thermionic emission valves that glowed in the dark and gave off a characteristic odour. Nice nostalgia! John wrote he was licenced in 1964 and as a young amateur was drawn to operating on 40 and 20 Meters for many years. His Drake 2B shared table space with a Heathkit DX-40 and a Johnson Viking VFO. But he lacked local contact with other amateurs so became involved with VHF. John advised trying to expand your capabilities and your experience by widening your horizons into other areas of Amateur radio, to try to increase your code speed on HF, try your hand at working some DX, connect up your computer to a modem and try some of the digital modes.

In his RAMBLINGS column, President Jerry Wells VE3CDS (sk) reflected on the events of previous months including the departure of Jeff VE3RCI who moved to Western Canada. He noted the annual Flea Market turned out very well in spite of the rather unexpected snow storm. He offered some comments and a few suggestions to the members which are not surprisingly, still relevant today in 2002. He wrote that Radio Amateurs have a

Jeff called for any of the Club Executive to join in and Ted VE3KEH, Club Secretary checked in with congratulations. Jerry VE3CDS, President, also called with his words of encouragement and expressed his hope that the net would continue. General instructions for the Net Controllers had been developed, the net managers assumed responsibility for training, for providing advice and feedback on performance.

#### BEFORE YOU ASK THE QUESTIONS, HERE ARE THE ANSWERS:

- 1) The total cost of this equipment cannot be discussed here as it creates marital conflicts.
- 2) No, we cannot send a message to your brother in Hong Kong. We suggest you call Western Union.
- 3) This is strictly a hobby; we do not have the facilities or the time to fool around with TV sets, radios or hi-fi. We suggest that you see a serviceman.
- 4) Yes, the antenna in the backyard is essential to the operation of the equipment.
- 5) The farthest station we have contacted has been in the Ubangiland.
- 6) The cards on the wall are called QSL cards. They are confirmation of contacts made with other stations.
- 7) It is technically impossible for this station's equipment to interfere with television reception, telephones or stereo systems. Any interference problems of that nature are caused by design flaws in the home-entertainment devices themselves.

- 4) It is customary for guests to make complimentary remarks about this station and its licensed operator when talking to other hams on the air.
