OCTOBER 17, 2002, GENERAL MEETING PRESENTATION

WW-II Enigma Cipher Machine - The Canadian Perspective and Contributions

Richard Brisson will make a presentation consisting of an introduction to the history of the Enigma in terms of its inception and commercialization. He will describe events of the critical 1930's, which included the take-over of the Enigma company as part of the re-arming of Germany, and the incredible cryptanalytic effort in Poland. The main portion of his presentation will focus on code breaking of the Enigma during WW-II, in particular at Blechtley Park in the UK, and the role that Canada played in support of this activity. ❖

"The largest single reason for volunteering is born of the desire to serve the public in the best way they know how - as communicators. They, therefore, have a right to expect courteous, considerate, fair and impartial treatment for their boss or leader. Courtesy is always mandatory; rudeness will cost dearly. You must always consider your volunteer workers feelings, be tolerant of their faults in addition to learning and compensating for their weaknesses. Above all, be cognizant at all times of the fact they are taking precious time from their families and friends. Loyalty and consideration are paramount at all times if the job is going to get done. Volunteers should never be criticized in public, but even in private, the action should be criticized and not the person. When leading volunteers, the boss should not try to be "all things to all people." Leaders must be diplomatic, a friend and expert, and above all a really good listener. The approach should be to lead the group, not simply to manage or direct it. Good luck to all!"

Selection Criteria and Process

The submission of nominees and selection of the award winner will be based on the following criteria.

Each nominee for the award must have been a fully paid up member of the OVMRC and a licensed Radio Amateur during the most recently completed club fiscal year starting July 1, 2001 and ending June 30, 2002 (Award Year).

Nomination must be received in writing, in the required format, prior to, or during the regular September meeting. Each nomination must be supported by not less than two Full Members who were in good standing during the Award Year, and must include a short narrative description of the nominee's contribution to Amateur Radio as specified in criteria 3, which follows:

To be eligible, nominee must have made a significant contribution during the Award Year to further any of the objectives of the OVMRC by:

Contributing to the interest, study and progress of the science and art of Amateur Radio with particular emphasis on mobile operations;

Co-operating with and assisting the civil authorities to the fullest extent possible in any emergency; or by

Fostering good will and understanding among Radio Amateurs.

The eligibility of nominees will be verified by the Executive.

The names of the nominees and the short narrative descriptions provide by the nominators will be published in the November issue of the Rambler.

The Award winner will be determined by SECRET BALLOT by all members attending the regular meeting held on November. Two Full Members in good standing who are not nominees or nominators will be
