

Meeting Minutes

General meeting June 19, 2003

Ken McKenzie, VA3NEK, opened the meeting announcing that Mike Kennedy, VA3TEC, had resigned as President.** (Please see the note at the end of the minutes.)

He explained that there had been no nominating committee struck in April and the lack of volunteers was a problem in getting things done.

The Budget for the up coming year was presented by the Treasurer, Ken Gill, VA3KJG. Ken also presented the current state of the Corporation's finances.

Ken Halcrow, VE3SRS, presented a report on the Trailer project as well as an explanation of the Emergency Preparedness Committee's budget.

There was a quorum present so a vote was taken on accepting the proposed budget. The budget was accepted as presented.

Adam King, VA3PIP, as Membership Chairperson, RAC Bulletin 03-018E - Morse requested that members should renew early and renew often.

Adam also presented an update on the details of the Field Day operations.

The 50/50 draw of \$28.50 was won by VE3LBW Peter Hafichuk.

RAC Bulletin 03-017E - WRC-2003 Drops Morse Requirement

The World Radiocommunication Conference (WRC-2003) held in Geneva, Switzerland, 9 June to 4 July, 2003, has dropped the Morse code examination requirement for radio amateurs. In the face of pressure by some administrations to retain Morse testing, the conference decided to keep Morse as a recommended amateur qualification, but that it would be up to individual administrations whether or not they retain a Morse examination requirement. The dropping of Morse testing was one of a number of changes to Article 25 of the Radio Regulations that will take effect on Saturday, 5 July.

This change does not mean that Industry Canada will automatically or immediately drop Morse testing. Industry Canada will likely want to determine the wishes of Canadian radio amateurs and will have to determine what Canadian regulatory changes, if any, first will be necessary. Radio Amateurs of Canada has already commenced discussions with Industry Canada on the future of Morse testing in the meetings of the Canadian Amateur Radio Advisory Board (CARAB).

RAC Vice-president Regulatory Affairs, Jim Dean, VE3IQ, the amateur radio member on the Canadian delegation, participated in the review of the radio regulations pertaining to the Amateur Service.

Requirement Remains in Canada Pending Review of WRC Decisions

In the wake of the decisions regarding Morse qualifications made at the World Radiocommunication Conference (WRC)-2003, Industry Canada's Amateur Radio Service Centre and RAC have received numerous queries about the status of Morse examinations in Canada and the qualifications required for HF operation. Canadian radio amateurs are advised that Basic and Morse Qualifications are still required for operation below 30 MHz and that this requirement will remain pending a review by Industry Canada of the remain pending a review by Industry Canada of the impact of the WRC-2003 regulatory changes on the Canadian radio regulations, policies and procedures.

While the new international regulations, which dropped Morse from the Treaty requirements and left a Morse qualification to the discretion of administrations, became effective 5 July, 2003, each administration (country) still must individually decide whether it will retain a Morse qualification requirement. Canada must now decide what it will do.

RAC will be working with Industry Canada on the review of the impact of the new international regulations and will keep Canadian amateurs informed through Bulletins, the RAC web site and "The Canadian Amateur". Amateurs should send their comments and views on Morse retention or deletion to their RAC regional Director.

RAMBLER SEPTEMBER 1993

There was no July/August issue of the RAMBLER this year as there was no Editor to produce one. Our former Editor Neil Herber VE3PUE, had moved on to "greater and greener" pastures, so Jerry Wells VE3CDS produced the RAMBLER himself this month. The front page of the double-sided three page September RAMBLER featured the President's RAMBLINGS. President Jerry Wells VE3CDS, wrote about the good weather we had over the summer compared to the previous year. Jerry wrote about joining the "noble order of professional loafers," which supposedly gives a person all sorts of leisure time to become an "expert napper and coffee breaker." He wrote, "Well it is all a pack of lies, obviously spread by word of mouth by some in our midst." He had not found a lot of "leisure time to sit and smell the daisies." Most of his time was taken up by activities related to Amateur radio. taken up by activities related to Amateur radio. Members commented that this was one of the best Field Days and Jerry was pleased to see so many newly licenced members out to set up, operate and to take down the Field Day equipment. He was impressed with the new members of the Executive who turned out with enthusiasm and assisted with everything. Jerry also noted that a video was made of Field Day and it was in the process of being edited for viewing at the September meeting. I have that video among many others taken over the last ten years of various OVMRC events. The other notworthy event of the summer occurred August 13, 14 and 15, 2003 when our club participated again in the Techno-Days display held on the front lawn of the Museum of Science and Technology. Jerry received excellent comments from the Museum staff as a result of our Amateur radio demonstration station. He ended his RAMBLINGS with a few notes about the OVMRC's revised Amateur Radio Course. The course was offering more practical hands on training for students, and also another text book, W1FB's "Help for New Hams" published by the ARRL. The course was also extended beyond the normal exam date at the end of March to the end of June for those who wanted further practical training.

Richard VE3UNW, reported on the EXPO Techno '93 held at the Museum. A military tent was put up on Thursday evening in preparation for the three-day event. Al VE2TYJ looked after the set-up and tear-down with his well-organized crew. Radio Operations was handled by Steve VE3RUU and he ran three special "WELCOME MAT" nets on each day and caught a few people of guard that thought it was Wednesday at 19:00 hrs! Five time slots of the Trans-Provincial Net were run under VE3JW callsign by Steve VE3RUU, Bill VE3WCE, Dave VE3QQQ, Rick VE3IHI, Richard VE3UNW, Jacques VE3TSC, and Tim VE3QDX. There were about 35 Amateurs that checked-in during each hour and they were sent a QSL card from VE3JW. Richard noted the Museum staff were very friendly and helpful and provided excellent cooperation.

FROM THE WISE OWL NET....

Leo Desjardins VE3NVL, Net Manager for the club's "Wise Owl Net" reported that a total of 210 Amateurs had checked in during the period of September 1992 until the last net of the season held on June 25, 1993. There were 42 nets, a total of 2700 minutes or 45 hours and a total of 1334 QNI. Sydney VE3GVI was thanked for conducting his special Christmas Day net. The eleven Wise Owl "qualifying nets" for class A and class B "Wise Owl Certificates" were held from January 15 through to March 26, 1993. You may have one of these very nice certificates hanging on your wall, I do. Leo thanked the net controllers for the 1992/93 season which included Bob VE3YBC, David VE3ZZU, Dave VE3QOQ, John VE3ACI, Ian VE3SNX and Al VE2TYJ and he encouraged everyone to join the net when it resumed operation on Friday Sept 3, 1993. until the last net of the season held on June 25, 1993.

Jerry Wells VE3CDS included a short note to members to have a look up on the roof of the Museum when they arrived for the Sept 16, 2003 meeting.
