QSL card competition

After operating the Club station, VE3RAM, we do receive a few QSL cards. At the moment we do not have a VE3RAM QSL card to reply with, therefore we would like to have a competition to see which Club member can come up with the best card. The design can be up to you but we would like to have a few guidelines.

- » The card should have the standard dimensions of 3.5"x5.5" and be single sided.
- » There should be space to write the usual required information for a QSL confirmation.
- » There should be space (perhaps with a line) in the top right of the card for writing the name of the callsign for the destination of the card.
- » The card should well reflect the Club.
- » There should be space to enter the name of the Club operator (if known) who made the contact, as well as space for equipment details perhaps.
- » Include nothing that could offend.
- » Do not use copyrighted material unless you and the Club can have permission. Be aware that images etc. can be copyrighted even if there is not the copyright symbol (c). For example, if you post a photograph on the web, which you took, you have the copyright to it and nobody can legally take and use that image, or part of it, without your permission.
- » RAC logos can be obtained at http://www.rac.ca/service/logos.htm

Ideally the whole card should be available in electronic format. The card will be reproduced by printing four cards on a letter sized page and this will then be colour photocopied.

If you submit a card feel free to include details on how you, or perhaps a family member, made the card.

Bring your card to the November meeting where they will be displayed and later judged. The winning design will be used by the Club.

A syou read this you know that our September General Meeting with its' new executive offices has just finished. You now know the direction the club will be taking for the next year (See what happens when you acclaim the club executive) and personally I think we are in for a good year.

Now that we are heading towards our October Meeting I should warn you that I am our guest speaker. I will be talking about Portable Operations and Compromise Antennas. As my backyard is approximately 20' by 20'

and I am able to operate 70cm to 80m with some small level of success it seems natural that I give the talk. If your excuse for not getting on the air is that you can't get your antenna up then this is the meeting not to miss. Our second speaker will be VA3SIE Martin who will be talking about the VA3SIE/VA3QV Maple Island Activation for the Canadian Islands on the Air Program.

Speaking of antennas.... The leaves will soon be leaving the trees and its time to plan for your new dipoles and loops. Speaking from experience it's much easier to string a dipole through a tree when the leaves have left. If you are not planning to get any new wire up in the trees then check out the wire you already have up. Its also easier to check things now before things break than in mid January when its 25 below.

A club like ours is only as good as its members and this year we are going to have a great club. This month I would like to showcase a couple of our Committee Chairs who do a super job keeping you the membership informed. In my previous ramblings I have already mentioned Jake VE2TQX and the Technical committee

Matthew VA3MHB and Jose VA3PCJ are our co-chairs for Radio Operations. The first 4 months since our new executive officers and committee chairs were acclaimed have been busy ones for both of them. Jose VA3PCJ looks after our 2 HF Nets. The Pothole nets run on Saturday at 1000hrs local time on 7.095 LSB and on Sunday again at 1000 hrs local time on 3.760 LSB.

Jose is in effect the Net Manager for both nets and must maintain the Net Control Station (NCS) operator's schedule so that we have a NCS for each net. Previous experience is not a requirement so if you are able to operate on HF why not help out your club and try a stint as NCS. The hours are good but the pay is lousy. If you have the operating privileges but not the equipment let me know and perhaps a portable station could be set up at a location near you (Have Radio will Travel). Matthew has the same need for controllers for the Wise Owl Net. If you were not available on the weekend then maybe a Friday night would be better. Once again equipment is not an issue. Another person who gives his time freely and often to our cause is our Webmaster Elias VE3EKZ. I firmly believe that an up to date web site is a sign of a properly run operation. VA3MHB Goes 'Greyhound Mobile'

few weeks ago I decided to go on vacation to Sault Ste Marie. I made the thirteen hour trip by Greyhound bus. During the long bus ride I decided to operate.

From Ottawa to Sudbury I operated with my handheld radio, ICOM IC2AT with my rubber duck and 2.5 watts of power.

At Sudbury I switched to the mobile radio LINKO 22 ALRHT. I did this by putting the 26 hour amp sealed lead acid battery on the floor of the bus. I had the radio in my lap and the 5/8th mobile antenna on top of a cookie sheet on the seat beside me. I ran this for the rest of the way home.

On the way back to Ottawa I ran the mobile radio all the way home with the only difference being that the radio was on the seat beside me and the antenna was on top of the cookie sheet in front of me, this set-up gave me more room.

At one point on my way to Ottawa, I wondered if I could get into one particular repeater. I decided to switch to my handheld radio and rubber duck. At this point I was 30km west of Manatoulin Island when I managed to make contact with VE3BLF. She told me that she was very surprised to find out I was getting into the repeater 30km away from inside a bus.

After speaking to her I switched back to the mobile and connected with VE3LTY and VE3YX, among several other contacts.
