MORSE CODE QUITE ALIVE

How was your Field Day? If you were around for it, you certainly know how Morse code filed up the CW portion of the bands. Excellent propagation, with openings on 6 meters, 10 meters going strong, and so on up the scale.

Our OVMRC set-up, by modes rather than by bands this year, fared very well. I was assigned the CW tent and had a good team to handle it. Extra help came in to do some logging and we kept them very busy.

I had a brand new G5RV Junior, 40 to 10m, that had never been used. Gord, VE3XGD fired up his slingshot and had the antenna up in the trees in short order, oriented to

propagate South-West and we worked the four bands of the Junior.

The radio was the OVMRC Kenwood TS-850Sat fed by a 32 amp, Alinco DM-330MV, switching power supply. A small Honda 4-cycle generator (1,000 watts) was our emergency power source.

After planting a ground rod we retired into the tent and started operating on the 2 PM bell. None too soon as the inevitable rain for Field Day came to douse the site.

I started it off on the 20m band and the 'music' never stopped. Guy, VE3VCF, came in to relieve me and Bill, VE3LJG did some logging. Michel, VE3EMB and Joe, VE3EUS also did some logging. Richard, VA3RAX, newly licensed, was attending his first Field Day and he provided help around the sites and did some logging for us as well.

We used a very simple logging program called Squirl that allowed

(Continued from page 1) that Morse code is not dead indeed. Ante obtained his license three years ago and showed us what a young Amateur Radio operator can do to perpetuate a very useful and fun mode and to contribute to the advancement of radio communications.

About a year and a half ago, Ante, set out to learn Morse code. After learning the letters and symbols he tuned in to the W1AW broadcast of Morse transmissions. He even recorded some of these transmissions and listened to them while driving his employer's vehicle rather than listen to the radio.

Before long he was on the air, joining a local slow speed net, and making his first contacts. He increased his speed to about 20 WPM and requested a spot in the CW tent for his first ever Field Day.

Ante showed up at the CW tent with a key around his thigh. It was a miniature key with a single lever, a sideswiper American Morse Mini-B. He was copying and answering stations coming at him at around 35 WPM. Ante provided nearly half of all the contacts at our CW tent.

OK you'll say, great effort from a young, new operator, congratulations!

But wait, there is more to it. Ante is right handed, and from the start, he

trained himself to send with the left hand on a single lever key on which he had reversed the dits and dahs from left/right to right/left. How ingenious! He practiced Morse code with the left hand so that he could free his right hand to do the writing, handle the computer mouse or tap



on the keyboard.

We very much appreciated his willing effort and great contribution to our special event. I was proud to show visitors his dexterity at operating. At times, he was logging two contacts a minute. You can see Ante in action on the web at: www.youtube.com/user/VE3EMB? feature=chclk
