December is the month of giving and receiving, and I hope your wish list of new radio equipment is well fulfilled even if you have to buy it and give it to yourself. This applies most to the students in the OVMRC amateur radio course that should have a nice new and crisp Certificate of Proficiency in Amateur Radio and Call Sign freshly minted and gift wrapped by Industry Canada.

As you recall, our October meeting featured club member Bryan Rawlings, VE3QN giving a talk on "Regulating Radio" on the International scene. This was just before Bryan was off to the World **Radiocommunication** Conference in Genera Switzerland. Bryan has returned and he is very happy to report "mission accomplished". The outcome of WRC 2015, Agenda item 1.4 is yet another international radio allocation for the amateur service and the first new HF amateur band since 1979. This was only achieved after marathon negotiations and compromise between the various National delegations; most of which had gone into the conference with the position "no change" (including the USA) meaning no 5 MHz band allocation for the amateur service. Canada and Industry Canada had always supported a new 5 MHz allocation throughout the process.

Russia finally posed no continued opposition accepting a 15 watt EIRP power limitation within 6,000 km of their borders which includes Canada and the USA. Mexico being outside this range will be allowed 20 watts EIRP. The amateur allocation is a mere 15 kHz between 5351.5 to 5366.5 kHz with secondary status to incumbent primary status users. It should be noted this allocation encompasses our existing spot 60 metre frequency of 5358.5 kHz (channel 3) where we are allowed, at the present time, 100 watts ERP. It remains to be seen how this will be reconciled by Industry Canada when it is authorized domestically to the amateur service within the next couple of years. In any event, thanks to Bryan for his dedicated pro bono work on this project and his fine and friendly multilingual negotiating skills that we are sure. were very much an asset in realizing the successful outcome of this Agenda item.

To help fund this important work, OVMRC members voted yes to a motion at our November meeting to increase this year's budget to allow an increase for donations; this includes the Defense of Amateur Radio Fund (DARF) administered by RAC. DARF is a trust fund exclusively for the purpose financing travel and expenses of a Canadian amateur radio delegate to the World *(Continued on page 3)*

OVMRC life member, Ralph Cameron, VE3BBM, provided a very interesting and photo rich presentation at the November meeting on the history of the radio communications network between the Diefenbunker and other associated ultra secret Cold War facilities operated by the military in Canada. The presentation by Ralph was based on a lot of personal research contacting many of the folks that worked at the Diefenbunker and other sites during the era; some of the folks were still reluctant to talk about their experiences worrying the information was still classified. Ralph now volunteers at the Diefenbunker Museum in Carp where an amateur radio station is established. You can meet Ralph and other west end hams that volunteer at the Diefenbunker most Tuesdays evenings.

Amateur Allocation at 5 MHz. Done!

(This was the title of Bryan Rawlings, VE3QN, email message on November 18 from Geneva: the text of which follows)

At the Sixth Plenary of WRC-15 held this afternoon (Geneva time) the proposal for a new secondary allocation to amateur radio at 5 MHz passed both 1st and 2nd readings.

This effectively ends the four-year trek to bring Agenda Item 1.4 to fruition. The changes to the Radio Regulations authorizing the new band will appear in the WRC-15 Final Acts which will be available provisionally at the end of next week and in a formal document some weeks later. The changes are tentatively expected to be effective 1 January 2017. Of course, in Canada, Industry Canada must still follow their processes - likely to include a public consultation before authorizing Canadian amateurs to use the new band.

The new allocation is for 15 kHz between 5351.5 and 5366.5 kHz and - for Canada - a power limit of 15 watts e.i.r.p. would apply.

The smaller-than-hoped size of this allocation, the unusual band edges and the modest power limit reflect the painful compromises that over twenty hours of stressful negotiations resulted in. It is worth reflecting that with both the U.S. and Russia committed to "no change" along with a couple of dozen more countries the outcome defied the odds. There will be an article in the next issue of TCA in both languages and you are free to use any of the foregoing in communicating generally and with the members.

I will continue to post to Facebook and Twitter under the Hashtag #RACatWRC15.

The day started cloudy here in Geneva but - perhaps because of our good news - Geneva is now bathed in sunshine!



Canadian 0 - 30MHz Band Plan Effective Date: December 1, 2015

1. This is a simplified version of the official RAC Band Plan. Not all permissible modes/activities are represented.


2. LSB is used on 160, 80 and 40m.
USB is used on all other bands that permit SSB, including 60m. **3.** Consult various online resources for detailed information on what


digital modes are used. **4.** Maximum bandwidth permitted on 2200m is 100 Hz. Maximum power is 1 Watt EIRP.

5. Refer to the IC and RAC websites for full details before operating on the new 60m channels.

6. Remember not to allow your signal to spill over into adjoining band segments when operating close to the edges. During major weekend contests, activity in certain modes can spill over into other segments. Operators should avoid NCDXF beacons on 14.100, 18.110, 21.150, 24.930 and 28.200 MHz.
7. This graphic is a living document and will be reviewed and updated periodically to reflect changes in the band plans and operating habits.
