i Folks:

The April meeting was pretty busy; we had 45 folks in attendance and it didn't break up until after 10 p.m. Nevertheless, every part of the meeting was important and I think captured the attention of everybody, especially the excellent presentation by Bryan Rawlings, VE3QN on his involvement representing the interests of Canadian radio amateurs at the upcoming World Radio Conference scheduled this November in Sharm El-Sheikh, Egypt. Bryan will be attending the conference on behalf of Radio Amateurs of Canada and sponsored from the proceeds of the "Defence of Amateur Radio Fund" to which the OVMRC made a \$600 donation this year.

We had a number of OVMRC members providing communications support on May 5th for the CN Bike Ride for CHEO. The weather was great and the event went well. We've received a

report from Arthur Smith, VA3BIT who rode patrol on his motorcycle together with a bunch of event photos from Dave VE3ZZU that we feature in this issue of the Rambler. Bravo to all the radio amateurs that made the event a success for another year. The event raised a record amount of money this year for CHEO, \$1,178,539.09

We have posted on the Club's home page the proposed revisions to the Club's By-Laws; these were last updated in 2012. We advised at the last meeting that these proposed revisions would be available on the web site for review by the membership and we hope folks have had a chance to read and review the proposed changes. We will raise a motion and conduct a vote of the membership that requires at least 2/3 acceptance. One of the main proposed changes to the existing By-Laws was the repeal of section 9.5 that limited any one of the 4 "Directors" positions to a maximum of 3 consecutive years serving in any one position. This would not have allowed Nicole VE3GIO to serve a 4th year and beyond as Club Treasurer. We are grateful for Nicole taking on this position 3

It is a busy job because of the growth of the Club in terms of members and our large enrolment in the radio course; this coupled with projects kits and coax sales has made the (Continued on page 3)

She also has the responsibility to prepare and file the Club's corporate T2 tax return to CRA and annually apply for the Club's liability insurance through RAC. To manage all this, Nicole has made use of a detailed open source public licence accounting software package. Nicole is now integrating database software to keep track of paid up membership ensuring folks coming to Club meetings are entitled to voting

privileges and other benefits of OVMRC membership.

The planned agenda for the May meeting will of course include the By-Laws vote, but also a call for folks to consider serving the Club as a Director or one of many Chairperson positions; such nominations should be passed along to the any one of the 4 Directors for a determination of eligibility according to our By-Laws. Together with incumbents willing to carry-on plus any new nominations, a slate of candidates will be prepared and published in the June Rambler and posted on the Web site for which a

membership vote will be conducted at the June AGM.

We will touch on Field Day preparations at the May meeting, however, we have reserved our regular meeting room for Wednesday June 5th for a special Field Day education and organization session. Proposed Revisions to By-Laws

Attention OVMRC Membership – Proposed Revisions to the OVMRC By-Laws

Available for download are the "Proposed Revisions to the OVMRC By-Laws". The Club's executive committee members have been working on revising the Club's By-Laws for several weeks and wish to raise a motion of acceptance by the membership at the May, 2019 meeting.

The main areas of revision include:

- Removal section 9.5 "Limitations on Terms of Office" that restricts Directors (President, Vice President, Treasurer, or Secretary) to serve more than 3 consecutive terms (of 1 year) in the same Director position. (At the present time, this restriction would prevent our existing Treasurer continuing to serve in that position for another year.) Of course, all incumbent Directors that agree to continue serving the Club can be challenged by appropriate nomination of another willing and eligible candidate and election at the Annual General Meeting in June.
- Adding to the responsibility of the Treasurer position the keeping of the membership database to facilitate better correlation of membership status with the payment of annual membership dues.
- Renaming what was previously known as the "Membership Committee" to "Reception and Welcoming Committee" and transferring the keeping of membership records to the Treasurer as indicated above.

- Removal of the "Amateur Radio Exhibit Committee" as the exhibit station at the Museum no longer exists.
- Many other word editing changes of various sections in keeping with name changes of the Department responsible to radio spectrum matters.
- Other additions to some sections to better define responsibilities of Directors and Committees, timing of posting notices, and methods of communicating business matters to the membership.

Also, the Club's executive committee seeks nominations for eligible and willing Club members (see section 8.2 of the By-Laws) that wish to serve the Club for any of the Director positions or chairpersons of committees as defined in the By-Laws. Such nominations can be sent to any Director of the Club and a determination will be made whether or not the candidate is eligible.

For a person to be eligible to serve as a director of the Club, the candidate must be a member in good standing for at least two consecutive years. (see By-Law 8.2)



In preparation in trying to find the hidden transmitter, you may want to build a measuring tape 2 metre directional yagi antenna.

CN Bike Ride for CHEO

Report by Arthur Smith, VA3BIT

This year's CN Cycle event can be considered an unmitigated success from several points of view. The organizers have said that \$1,155,727 was raised with about 4300 participants cycling, walking and rollerblading. About 2700 of those cycling were on the 35K and 70K routes.

We had 30 hams volunteer this vear with five of us mobile and 25 stationary at 14 locations including three in the Command trailer behind the museum (Harold VA3UNK, Jeffrey VA3PEW, Roger VA3EGY), Gina VA3GNB and Ann VA3YYF at the ham radio tent at the front of the museum, and Georges VA3LZY and Scott VA1XXX at Net Control. Steve VA3MPS, Leo VE3LPH, Jeremy VA3ZTF, and Dave VE3TLY were riding bicycles. We don't have an amateur radio operator capable of riding at the necessary speeds of the 70K route for the entire 70km, so I was using my motorcycle for the latter half of that route.

Apart from getting the usual satisfaction of volunteering for a good cause, my focus each year is on implementing APRS. For one reason or another, glitches and failures have been common in previous years. This year, for the first time, APRS worked well and proved to be a valuable addition to Command and Net Control. We had five fill-in digipeaters, and the radios carried by our bicycle mobile cyclists were set to beacon at a higher rate than generally recommended. My intent was to

saturate 144.39 MHz, the standard frequency for APRS in North America. Such settings are not recommended for general use, but are needed in events such as CN Cycle so that Command can make real-time decisions based on the locations of the Trail and Patrol cyclists. For the fill-in digipeaters, I asked owners to ensure that UITRACE is set to ON with an alias of TEMP. For the cyclists, I asked that they configure their APRS-enabled radios to transmit with a path of "TEMP1-1, WIDE1-1,WIDE2-1". The "WIDE1-1,WIDE2-1" is the typically recommended path when beaconing in most of North America. Including "TEMP1-1" takes advantage of the numerous Kenwood TM-D710 transceivers in use. Kenwood, in collaboration with Bob Bruninga WB4APR, has sold their D710's with UITRACE set to ON by default, to allow all D710's to serve as digipeaters in case of emergency or special events such as CN Cycle for CHEO. I recommend that all portable hams include "TEMP1-1" in their paths.

For CN Cycle on Sunday, Dave VE3TLY had the best track of the five of us that were mobile. His Byonics Tiny Tracker was smart beaconing more often than generally recommended, as previously mentioned, but he had also optimized his setup prior to the event such as tuning the antenna on the rack of his bicycle so that it exhibited an SWR of less than 2:1. Leo VE3LPH's Tiny Tracker 3 also had good beacons, but not quite as good as Dave, perhaps because of the location of the antenna and radio. Jeremy VA3ZTF and I, VA3BIT, worked well, but aprs.fi showed that our beacons were not as frequent as

Dave's. Jeremy was using a Kenwood TH-D72, while I was using a TM-D710G installed into my motorcycle. A review of Dave's configuration compared to Jeremy's and mine reveals that Jeremy and I left our transceivers with the default configuration from the Kenwood factory, which is configured for standard operation using a motorized vehicle. Steve VA3MPS was beaconing using his iPhone using the aprs.fi app.

I want to continue our experiment with APRS next year at CN Cycle, or any event that can use APRS for that matter. For next year, for example, I will mirror the settings Dave has with his Tiny Tracker 3 on my Kenwood D710 and recommend that our other mobile hams do the same.

Despite the suboptimal tracks left by Jeremy and myself, I'm feeling really good about our APRS system this year. The fill-in digipeaters helped considerably, and the tracks generated by Dave and Leo leave me very optimistic that next year we'll all finally get up to speed about this APRS stuff.

I want to thank all hams that volunteered this year, and hope that not only do you help out again next year, but that all those who were unable to assist this year will be available next year as well. 
OVMRC Congratulates Gordon Grant – VE3DY, Founding member of the Club

VE3JW Returns to the Airwaves

Pre-amble

Maurice-André Vigneault. VE3VIG/VA2MA submitted the following article for inclusion in this issue of the Rambler. We share his lament about the demise of the VE3JW exhibit station that he and several other retired radio amateurs volunteered to operate regularly and demonstrate amateur radio to the visiting public. Unfortunately, following the closing of the Science and Technology Museum for repair and renovations, we

were called to a meeting at the time by Museum officials and told that the rebuilding of exhibits would not include the VE3JW amateur radio station. We were told the design of the exhibits would be more interactive with the visiting public and not necessarily dependant of volunteer interpreters. Since that time several years ago, the Club executive has not pursued with the Museum folks any further discussions about re-establishment of an exhibit station at the Museum since those involved in running the OVMRC were all too busy running an effective program for Club meetings and re-

building the membership base. That said, the Club should not abandon the idea of again putting forth a credible proposal to Museum officials to re-establish an exhibit amateur radio station at the Museum. How receptive the Museum folks would be to such a proposal remains to be seen. If any member of the club is interested and capable in developing and marketing a well crafted proposal to the Director General of the Science and Technology Museum on behalf of the Club, please let us know and we can discuss.

The Amateur Radio Exhibit Station VE3JW was officially opened on 19 March 1974 at the Canada Science and Technology Museum in Ottawa. It operated continuously for 40 years, albeit, except for silent periods during rebuilding and renovations of the station.

In 2014, the CSTM was demolished and rebuilt, and it reopened in 2017.

The Plan's engineers for the new Museum did not consider making room for the VE3JW station as the OVMRC could not confirm a steady flow of bilingual operators for the station, which is a requirement for Federal institutions in the Capital City. Nevertheless, the Museum Administration had always kept in mind the possibility of accommodating the VE3JW group if only for their satellite communications and contacts with astronauts on the International

Space Station, a great attraction for the public at the Science Museum. We heard them mentioning that they would provide help for setting up antennas on the new roof.

So, possibly, all hope is not in vain. May be if we can provide the Museum with a list of committed Amateur Radio Operators who have a working ability in both official languages, we can sway them into accepting VE3JW operation at the Museum once again. Just a thought and a day dream at the moment.

But, VE3JW did in fact return to the airwaves recently, although not at the Museum. On 19 March 2019 we, the many operators responding to my calls, celebrated the 45th anniversary of the official opening of the VE3JW station at the CSTM by activating my home station with the call VE3JW for a 24 hour period, universal time (UTC).

As "Dame Chance" would have it, the first contact was from the President of our OVMRC club,

VE3NA, Barry, followed by a second contact with our Vice-President, VE3LC, Norm. This was a great opening for our special event!

My station is very modest, being as it is in a high rise apartment; an ICom all bands/all modes IC-7000, and a D-Star digital voice IC-880H, with, respectively, 45 feet of wire curled around the balcony (functioning with the efficiency of a wet noodle) and a dual band vertical on a metal plate. The intention was to work VHF FM voice repeaters and a simplex frequency, UHF digital voice reflectors, HF CW and SSB mainly on 20m.

The 20m band being closed for most of that day, poor propagation, the majority of the contacts were made on 2m. Nevertheless, toward the later part of the afternoon, we had an opening on 20m and it granted us international contacts such as Texas, Venezuela, Germany.

Many callers well remembered our top-ranked station and expressed longing for the ideal station that provided an access and an opportunity for handicapped operators and apartment dwellers. Some recalled the fun and joy of operating JW and discovering new modes. Mention was made of the great façade/window for Amateur Radio for the visiting public.

Band opening and under-utilized local repeaters didn't allow for an extensive list of contacts but for all those that responded it felt like a valuable contact as they filled it with congratulations for the 45th anniversary.

Vive VE3JW!

Editors note: For the last 5 years, VE3JW has been used as the official OVMRC Field Day call sign, and VE3RAM relegated to the Club's GOTA field day operations. Log Book of the World accounts have been opened for both call signs and Field Day QSOs logged since they have all been recorded electronically.

1. Call to order:

Vice President, Norm Rashleigh, VE3LC, standing in for President, Barry Allison, VE3NA, called the meeting to order at 19:22 There were 45 in attendance including one guest and one new ham.

Michael VE3WMB updated members on the Club Project, 'High Altitude Balloon (HAB) Launch' called 'Project Aries'. Groups IO now has 17 subscribers signed onto ARIESHAB, the subgroup. 8 attendees met on March 26 for the kickoff meeting.

Hardware - The Beacon is fully functional and the Beacon code is now called "ORION". The project

total expense to date is now \$53.37.

What's Next? - There is no need for a permit under Air Regulations. More coding is needed and the hardware evaluation and integration is required. The possible target launch date is October, 2019. Sourcing the helium is required to ensure a good quality gas at a cost effective price. The project presentation with updates is viewable on Groups.IO under OVMRC. Goonhilly Earth Station is supporting the project, providing hosting for the Ground Station facility at their worldfamous site in Cornwall, UK. Following commissioning of the satellite on February 12, 2019 the Qatar Amateur Radio Society (OARS) invited radio amateurs worldwide to use the Es'hail-2 / QO-100 narrowband transponder https://amsat-dl.org/en/qo-100-nbtransponder-experimentaloperation
